
Fall armyworm

Fall armyworm (Spodoptera frugiperda)

- Fall armyworm is an exotic pest that has been detected in Queensland.
- Adults can fly long distances and migrate quickly. They can also be spread through movement of plants and plant products.
- Signs of the pest could include egg masses, plant leaf damage or fruit or vegetable damage.



Eggs are pale yellow in colour. Egg masses stick to foliage with a mould/silk-like furry substance.



The larvae are light coloured with a larger darker head. As they develop, they become darker with white lengthwise stripes. They also develop dark spots with spines.

The adult moths have a brown or grey forewing and a white hind wing, and a wingspan of 32 to 40 mm. Male fall armyworms have more patterns and a distinct white spot on each of their forewings.

Pest risk

Fall armyworm caterpillars eat more than 350 different plants, including corn, sugarcane, rice and many vegetable and fruit crops.

Crops can be ruined almost overnight without control measures when population levels are high.

It may also have an impact on Australia's natural environment.
